But family makes everything twice as bright.





Student Council would like to thank all that participated and supported the food drive.




#### Emily Dunn First Grade

During the weeks of January 8th to January 19th Student Council will be collecting money for the Genesee Valley Rotary Camp (GVRC). Below is a description of the camp from their website <a href="https://gvrc.org/about/">https://gvrc.org/about/</a>

Genesee Valley Rotary Camp (GVRC), is a one week summer camp for young people (ages 8-21) with various disabilities. GVRC is a not-for-profit organization that became incorporated in 1963 and has served children and young adults from four surrounding counties (Livingston, Steuben, Wyoming, and Allegany) ever since.

The camp experience is provided free of cost through the efforts and financial support of the Rotary Clubs of the Genesee Valley and through private donations.

The camp runs every summer during August and is located in the beautifully rustic setting of Camp Sam Wood, in Pike, NY. GVRC services approximately 100 campers and employs about 60 staff members each summer.

GVRC currently serves the following Western New York towns: Dansville, Wayland, Geneseo, Avon, Perry, Mt. Morris, Livonia, Lima, Fillmore, Pavilion, Nunda, Belmont, Caledonia – Mumford, Cuba, Friendship, and Wellsville.


There are accessible trails from tent sites to the bathrooms, swimming pool, recreation and dining areas. Special dietary needs are accommodated by our kitchen staff.

As in the past we will be holding a contest for which classes can raise the most money in the following divisions: K-2, 3-6, Middle School and High School. The goal is to raise as much as we can to benefit GVRC. Last year as a school we raised over \$1200 and the Friendship Rotary added another \$1400. We are hoping to exceed that amount this year.










## **Halloween Festivities 2023**





### Forensics Class

The Forensics class analyzed different tool marks using pumpkins as the testing surface!! The impressions made by tools leave very distinctive marks when it is forced against another surface. The students tested several different tools and measured the damage to the pumpkin surface. This will allow them to analyze tool marks at upcoming mock crime scenes. The class also practiced taking exact measurements of a "body" at a crime scene. Taking precise measurements to understand the exact position at the scene is vital to crime scene investigations.
